The rest of the journey and



FABRIC ART WORKSHOPS

presented by

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EARTH WIND FIRE & WATER

- a five-day adventure!

WARNING: This is NOT a sewing workshop; it is an ART workshop that happens to use sewing machines!

This workshop introduces participants to a variety of methods that can be applied to existing and future projects.

While we will adhere to the basic theme of the workshop most of the time, there will also be a daily quick exercise thrown in to loosen up the creative juices and unleash possibilities!

MATERIALS LIST

- ♦ A portable sewing machine. Please come to the workshop comfortable and <u>familiar with the workings of your machine</u>, particularly the free motion/darning capabilities. Only straight stitch and zig zag stitching are required.
- ♦ An iron and towels or portable ironing surface;
- ♦ 3 metres of 'heat and bond lite iron on adhesive';
- ♦ A selection of regular **sewing threads** in a variety of colours; an ordinary **qlue stick**;
- ◆ **Tracing paper**, either a roll or 11" x 14" sheets (available at art stores);
- ◆ Paper and fabric scissors;
- ♦ A disappearing fabric marker or tailor's chalk, a ruler, pencils, crayons and regular markers;
- ◆ A **cutting edge**, cutting **board** and cutting **blade** (preferably a #11 scalpel);
- ◆ An old bedsheet or a several metres of broadcloth (white, or ivory) to use as backing for projects;
- ◆ Fabric scraps mainly muted prints and solids in a variety of weights and textures, plus a good selection of sheers and organzas. (Avoid the quilters' favourites, i.e. cotton prints in readymade sky, leaf motifs, or repetitive patterns etc.)
- ◆ A small selection of papers (optional) tissue or handmade;
- ◆ A portable lightbox (optional);
- ♦ One or two prepared canvases by that I mean two 14" x 14" pieces (approx. size only) of backing fabric (old sheet, or other plain material) sandwiched together with a piece of bonded Heat `n Bond LITE to provide a firm stitching base ... do not trim, allow margins on either side of the fused base.
- ♦ *Most important of all* ... bring **a sense of humour** and be prepared to have fun!
